VILLAGE NAME

We have had a request from Farrell, Pa. asking how the village that our folks come from in Italy got the name of Settefrati. Father Marsella, the present archpriest of the village did a scholarly work in this field. He looked up ancient books and manuscripts in the libraries of the Abbey at Monte Cassino and in the Vatican and then we te all that he found out in a little book called The Madonna of Canneto (La Madonna di Canneto) published by D'Amico, Sora, 1939. The facts mentioned below are taken from this book.

About 293 years before Christ was born, the Romans went to war against a city named Comino where the Sannities, an Italic tribe, lived. Almost everyone in the city was killed, but those who could get away ran into the mountains where they started little villages of their own. One of these is the one we know today as Settefrati.

Around 529 years after Christ was born Saint Benedict and his monks, operating from their monastary at Monte Cassino nearby, traveled about these villages in the mountains to tell the people about Christianity. It was then that the village became known by its present mame which means the Village of Seven Brothers. It was given this name in honor of the 7 sons of St. Felicita who were burned to death in Rome around 164 A.D. because she would not give up her Christian faith. Before that time the village was known as Vico which in Latin means "hamlet".

Before the war they used the school building to carry out their activities and received some things in the way of food and clothing for themselves and their wards from families that had a little to give. They were bombed out of the School House during the war, however, and now none of the families have anything to give away. They ask our folks here in America if they would help.


